# BUILDING RESILIENCY, INCLUSIVITY, COMMUNITY, AND IMPROVING RETENTION IN ALPINE ONTARIO U16 RANDOM START ORDER

Starting with the 2023/24 season, Alpine Ontario, with the unanimous support of the Alpine Ontario Athletic Committee and backed by Alpine Canada's High-Performance System Working Group, will implement Random Start Order at the U16 level. This start order will be implemented for divisional and OCUP U16 races, except OCUP Finals, which will still operate under divisional seeding.

AOA will join Alberta Alpine, BC Alpine, and USSA Rocky Mountain Division in implementing random start orders at the U16 level. This new start order aims to build resiliency and community and help to improve athlete retention.

"It's all about maintaining balance and snow contact when things get rough." Says Pat Biggs, AOA Executive Director and former World Cup racer. "We've got to remember that U16 is still relatively early in the 'train-to-train' learning phase within the greater context of our sport. Allowing all kids to race on a smooth course is fun and builds engagement! Having our lowest-pointed racers learn to race from the back develops strong character, setting them up for future sports success. On many fronts, it's moving us in the right direction as a development system".

As coaches, clubs, and a province, it's our duty to best prepare our kids for the next step in their athletic journey. With this change, it's our goal to develop versatile racers to ski well in less-than-ideal snow conditions and compete for podiums regardless of start position. This skill set will help build resiliency and prepare the athletes to transition into FIS racing after U16, where everyone starts at the back of the pack before earning their first FIS points. As an added benefit to the rule change, coaches in Colorado have noticed a heightened emphasis from their athletes on

Random start order gives all athletes the same advantages and disadvantages. Everybody gets a chance to start early, in the middle and late. This approach to racing at U16 can help improve engagement for higher-pointed athletes who previously always started in the worst conditions. Athletes with fewer participation opportunities or who are new to the sport don't need to worry about their point profile to be able to have their share of good start numbers.

We're building community. Random seeding contributes to a more cohesive group because of the mix of abilities at the start and finish. Athletes of all abilities have a better chance to create relationships simply because they are experiencing closer proximity to each other. Regions that have already implemented have noted an increase in athletes, parents, and coaches staying to the last racer to cheer on and encourage all racers.

Simple and equitable, here's how the new start order will operate:

#### **Group Draw and Start Order:**

RANDOM DRAW determines the starting order of the competitors in all alpine competitions (Slalom, Giant Slalom, Super-G).

The draw must take place on the day before the race. The draw must be held in a team captain's meeting. The Jury may allow a computer-assisted draw. A representative of each Club/Team MUST sign the team entry at the team captains' meeting before the draw is conducted by computer.

### **Starting Order for the 2nd Run:**

The second run will be the reverse order of the first run. Athletes who DNF or DQ will be permitted to start.
